- 14. NP noted that ArtSoc could help organise a theatre trip in late February or March. LSA suggested SA look into how much interest there would be.

F. VICE-PRESIDENT (OPERATIONS) REPORT

- 18. The website redesign has been going smoothly. There was concern over the colour choice used as it could signify a certain political party. SY suggested that a grey or purple bar with a gold hover, whereas BS suggested gold rather than yellow.
- 19. AA suggested Welfare Week could take place in the beginning of March. NP commented this may conflict with RAG Week and ArtsFest. However, there was general consensus that this timing is fine although it may conflict with elections

G. POSTGRADUATE MEMBERSHIP OF THE RCSU

RECEIVED: This item was verbally presented by SY.

NOTED:

- 21. There may be the possibility to increase student satisfaction by passing feedback, advice, and training down from postgraduates to undergraduates.
- 22. AA noted that postgraduate participation in departmental societies is not always low, for example in ChemSoc. AA continued that this may be because of influence from the department to make this happen (especially considering that a large number of chemistry undergraduates go on to further study within the department).
- 23. ZH asked how this would affect the representation network, to which SY reported the item is up for debate. It is possible for PGs to work with dep reps. ZH's idea was elaborated in

- being a good mechanism in providing mentoring advice to UG students interested in postgraduate study.
- 24. NP mentioned the Physics football tournament had significant interest from PG students, and there was demand to get involved in more. There is overall a need to make membership meaningful to PG students rather than it just being a label. There is a risk of the situation not being appropriate if UGs are telling PGs what they are and are not a member of and hence this could be driven through the GSU. JB replied that the GSU are unlikely to want to do this.
- 25. JP suggested that membership is built up from a departmental society level, starting with PG reps in each departmental society (like ChemSoc) before the RCSU as a whole. SY agreed this could be a good initial step in communication. There was concern from NP and BS that as PG students tend to congregate in small groups by research group, a PG rep may not be representative of all PG students, and there may not be interest in a PG rep anyway as GSU elections tend to have poor turnout. LSA replied that as some PG students feel there are no avenues open to them to get involved, creating a position would at least be a good first step. AA also noted that some departments have PG (Taught) representatives too.
- 26. NP pointed out there is some feeling that PGs do not wish to attend UG events as they are "run by a bunch of kids". JP continued in asking what could be done to build relationships between the two study groups. AA argued this would start on a departmental society level, and JB also noted the RCSU cannot run PG only events at the present as it does not fall under our aims and objectives. However, JB continued that a joint event could be created and money is set aside for running this. AA and BS pointed out that if a good event is organised, the stress of running a joint event goes away.
- 27. JP said overall he wanted to create a platform for PG students to at least get involved. JB agreed that research would be a good place to start, and creating a representative to act as a beacon for ideas would be a good first step.

H. OUTCOMING AND INCOMING DEAN OF FONS

RECEIVED: This item was presented by SY.

NOTED:

- 29. Only interaction with the FoNS at the present is a block grant, Science Challenge, and a number of teaching committees. There is a feeling there should be a stronger connection, especially as a town hall meetings conflicted with the RCSU's representation system and this could have been avoided through communication improvements.
- 30. The Make a Difference competition is thought to be poorly advertised. ZH asked what the competition is, and noted that the RCSU could likely publicise matters better than the faculty can due to our established communication methods.
- 31. AA asked what priorities are there for discussion with the incoming Dean, especially considering the block grant as this has remained static over a number of years. JB noted that the RCSU has received £5,000 annually since 2011 for the Science Challenge, and £10,000 since 2008 for general matters. As inflation has changed the value of money significantly since then, there may be an argument for changing the values. SY replied no priorities in mind however representation matters could be clarified.
- 32. LSA asked if the faculty is involved in Welfare, to which SY noted that these go through departmental officers and not ever the RCSU. JB continued there are a number of tiers of tutors however he is not aware if there is a FoNS allocated College Tutor. There was general concern of the welfare provision in the Department of Life Sciences, however it was felt this may not be something which needs to be pressured to deal with on a faculty level.
